OUR PURPOSE

IN AN ERA DEFINED BY SOUND BITES AND MEGABYTES,

never has a moment for reflection been more important. Some of the most critical issues in our national dialogue rest at the cross section of religion and public policy: whether it is the rise of the Christian Right in politics, debates about prayer in public schools, same-sex marriage, bio-ethical concerns, what Mormons believe, faithbased initiatives, the growth of mega-churches, the global revival of Pentecostalism, or the site-selection for a new mosque.

Everywhere we turn, the issue of "the faith angle" keeps coming up. Many members of the mainstream media recognize this as well. They embrace their role as responsible stewards of a national conversation, and realize that a deficit in knowledge about their fellow citizens' religious convictions can hamper their coverage. The Faith Angle Forum aspires to correct this imbalance and lack of perspective.

For more than ten years, the Faith Angle Forum has brought together a select group of nationally respected journalists and distinguished scholars for in-depth discussions of some of the most crucial issues facing Americans today. The invitation-only group is encouraged to escape the rigors of their daily beats and the rancor of partisanship to engage in thoughtful conversation and reflection.

Those who have attended have repeatedly said that these forums were one of the few places where they found the fairness, open-mindedness, and intellectual rigor that we have insisted upon and have consistently delivered. Discussions and dialogues only among true believers is not our style—we consciously make sure our participants are diverse, religiously and politically. We believe that real education and insight occur when all sides are represented by the best minds available.

Twice yearly, in South Beach, Miami, the Forum holds a two-day conference to discuss these important dimensions of our public life in a serious fashion, miles removed from Washington's ideological battlefields. The relaxed setting and intimate group size provide an atmosphere conducive to deeper contemplation not always possible in today's fast-paced world of breaking news.

They return to their work as journalists-refreshed and inspired—and share these sharpened insights with their readers and listeners. In this way, the mission of the Forums is carried deep into the main current of national conversation.

Barbara Bradley Hagerty, Religion correspondent for NPR, recounts how two specific Forum experiences influenced her work, below.

DECEMBER 2002 THE RISE OF GLOBAL **CHRISTIANITY**

Dr. Philip Jenkins, Professor of History and Religious Studies at Pennsylvania State University, hosted a session exploring the expansion of Christianity in Africa and the potential impact on the Episcopal Church.

This rich conversation predated the convocation of Bishop Gene Robinson, and what we all know now as a massive schism within Episcopalian ranks.

Presciently, six months before the major unraveling in the church, Hagerty reported on this phenomenon in a long, 8-minute piece for NPR, and continued to follow the story in 40+ subsequent reports.

After attending the session, Barbara Bradley Hagerty visited Newberg's lab to learn more, and observed an experiment analyzing a subject's brain wave outputs during prayer.

In 2009, Hagerty's book, Fingerprints of God: The Search for the Science of Spirituality was released and included half of a chapter on this topic.

Dr. Andrew Newberg, a medical doctor, professor, and neuroscientist at the University of Pennsylvania, gave a presentation on neurotheology, the link between brain function and expression
